Labette Center has purchased an Electronic Health Record to use within the agency. The product purchased is called BrightEHR. This product was designed by three other community mental health centers and has been determined to best meet the needs of Labette Center.

A team of professionals from BrightEHR and Family Services and Guidance Center met with members of Labette Center's implementation committee on March 2nd and 3rd to outline the strategies of implementation for our organization. Labette Center's implementation committee consist of Sandra Dickerson, project manager, Monica Simpson, recording secretary, Matt Atteberry, Shereen Ellis, Steve House, Ashley Heady, Jon Tower, and Deb Williams.

At various times, other individuals within the organization have been asked to supply input into the implementation process in an effort to make sure the product meets the needs of the organization.

Currently, the implementation committee is working on building the tables for the drop down fields within the product. This task is a large one and will take the committee approximately a month to complete.

The projected timeline for the implementation of the product is September to October of 2011. All individuals within the organization will receive training on the use of the product as it relates to their specific job. The committee has assigned a team of individuals to operate as an internal technical support team to the staff of Labette Center. The technical support team consists of Sandra Dickerson, Shereen Ellis, Beth Engels, Steve House, and Misti Mustain. Steve House will serve as the technical support liaison to the vendor, BrightEHR, technical support line.

The implementation committee is working diligently on customizing the BrightEHR package to fit the needs of the staff here at Labette Center. This product poses a huge change for the organization both in the way that we operate and in the way we as staff members think about our daily tasks. The members of the implementation committee along with the coordinators over the specialty programs have been encouraged to demonstrate the product to those interested in viewing it. The product is in the process of being customized so there may be additions or deletions from the product currently available.

This is an exciting time for the organization and the addition of an Electronic Health Record will streamline the process of charting, maintaining, and working with patient records here at Labette Center.

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Mental Health First Aid

LCMHS now has two individuals certified in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA). Mr. Matthew Atteberry, Executive Director and Ms. Shereen Ellis, Director of Clinical and Emergency Services, recently completed MHFA training and will soon be offering classes to the greater Labette Community.

"Approximately 20-25% of the adult US population has a diagnosable mental disorder at any given time," Atteberry said. "Making this class available to the public will help to normalize the stigma surrounding the disorders as well as vastly increasing awareness of what mental health is and what help is available."

MHFA is a groundbreaking public education program that helps the public identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. MHFA USA is managed, operated, and disseminated by three national authorities — the National Council for Community Behavioral Healthcare, the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, and the Missouri Department of Mental Health.

MHFA is offered in the form of an interactive 12-hour course that presents an overview of mental illness and substance use disorders in the US and introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common treatments. Those who take the 12-hour course to certify as Mental Health First Aiders learn a 5-step action plan encompassing the skills, resources and knowledge to help an individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional, peer, social, and self-help care.

The 12-hour Mental Health First Aid USA course has benefited a variety of audiences and key professions, including: primary care professionals, employers and business leaders, faith communities, state police and corrections officers, nursing home staff, mental health authorities, state policymakers, volunteers, young people, families and the general public.

"I'm really excited about this, it will literally put into the hands of the public some basic tools to help them understand what mental illness is," Atteberry said. "This will teach people how to assess the situation, listen supportively, and find help."

Ellis is also excited about bringing the information to the greater community. "I think it's just great, so many people don't know what to do with someone in a crisis like this. MHFA gives people the skills they need to know what's going on and how to better access the resources in the community."

2011 Kansas NAMI Walks

This year the Kansas NAMI Walks will be held on May 7th at Washburn University in Topeka. LCMHS is a proud supporter of NAMI Walks and encourages anyone who would like to participate to do so. The theme for this year is "Changing Minds . . . One Step at a Time". The NAMI walk is designed to help raise awareness of mental illness and mental health needs, as well as raise funds for programs that NAMI provides free to various communities. It has been a successful fundraiser since 2004 and is in hopes of reaching it's 2011 goal of \$120,000! In 2010, they had over 550 walkers and raised over \$107,000! There is no entry fee for the walk, but participants are encouraged to help raise donations for the event. Any individual walker who raises \$100.00 or more will receive a NAMI Walks event T-Shirt. How Good Are You at Portion Control?

How good are you at "guesstimating" the number of calories in the foods you eat? Even the pros have a hard time. Marion Nestle, a professor of nutrition, food studies and public health at New York University says, " Nearly everyone - including me - underestimates the calories in restaurant foods. People underestimate calories even more when the portions are large or the meals are promoted as healthful." Normal portion sizes were smaller 40 and 50 years ago. How do we know? Look at old plates and drinking glasses. A standard dinner plate used to be 9 inches in diameter. That's the size of a child's plate today. Juice glasses held 4 ounces. Today they're 6 or 8 or even 10 ounce glasses. Grab a bowl and a glass from your cupboard, fill them with water and measure the volume. You might find that a cereal bowl you thought held a cup of cereal actually holds 2 1/2 cups, meaning you've been eating more than twice what you planned. At dinner, put your food on a smaller plate and pay attention to the "serving" size. A serving of meat, fish, or poultry is about 3 ounces - or about half a can of tuna - but most of us have become accustomed to portion sizes of 8 ounces or more, according to a recent issue of the Tufts University Health & Nutrition Letter.

This year, the national theme will focus on building resilience in young children dealing with trauma. According to the SAMHSA website, "Communities around the country will participate by holding their own Awareness Day events, focusing either on the national theme, or adapting the theme to the populations they serve." SAMHSA has listed

the following as call to action points:

Calls To Action for Awareness Day 2011 National Event

- Integrate mental health and model resilience skills in every environment that has an impact on child development from birth.
- Enhance resilience and nurture social and emotional skills in young children from birth.
- Provide information to the public and teach them to recognize the signs of traumatic stress.
- Raise awareness that treatment for trauma is critical to achieving the milestones of a child's social and emotional development from birth.
- Promote trauma-informed services and supports in all child-serving settings.

Reaching Out To Those With Gambling Problems

LCMHS is now offering a 12-session treatment program to those with gambling problems or addictions, as well as treatment for their spouse/partner. Funding for the program has been made available through the Kansas State Problem Gambling and Addictions Grant Fund (PGAGF). Currently at LCMHS, Mark Mikel, LMSW, and Misti Mustain, LMLP, Community Support Services Coordinator, are certified Kansas State Gambling Counselors.

"For most people, gambling is fun and can be an enjoyable form of entertainment," Kansas Lottery Executive Director Ed Van Petten said. "However, for a few people, it can be a serious problem that leads to serious consequences."

Gambling addiction, or compulsive gambling, is a type of impulse-control disorder. Compulsive gamblers can't control the impulse to gamble, even when they know it is hurting them or their loved ones. Gambling is all they can think about and all they want to do, no matter the consequences. Gamblers can have a problem, however, without being totally out of control. Problem gambling is any gambling behavior that disrupts their life. If a person is preoccupied with gambling, spending more and more time and money on it, chasing losses, or gambling despite serious consequences, a gambling problem is evident.

"Gambling abuse poses a significant problem," LCMHS Executive Director Matthew Atteberry said. "The program we are offering provides a comprehensive approach and gives the client and their families the tools they need to impact their lives in a positive way."

Shereen Ellis, LSCSW, Director of Clinical and Emergency Services, is excited about the gambling treatment program, not only for the problem gambler, but also for their families. "This program helps the problem gambler learn to integrate the tools they need for financial stability. It also helps the family, by teaching them how not to enable, and how they can keep their family safe and not lose everything."

Ellis and Mikel both see gambling rising in popularity, especially among college-aged adults and with that popularity, the need for services is becoming more evident. "It's the latest thing, casinos are a warm, welcoming environment, free food, free drinks, it's all there."

"We can help the gamblers who might be having problems," Ellis concluded. "And I can't urge people enough to start early, before financial and relationship problems become an issue."

Kansas History in April

1 - [1925] - The Menninger Sanitarium, Topeka, was chartered with a capital of \$50,000. Its purpose was "to establish, support and maintain a private hospital and sanitarium for the care and treatment of persons suffering from illness, disease or infirmity, and particularly those afflicted with nervous and mental diseases."

3 - [1860] - the first Pony Express leaves St. Joseph for San Francisco. It is a weekly express.

4 - [1878] - Strike of Santa Fe Railroad employees.

7 - [1870] - The Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Co. organized, by the consolidation of the Neosho Valley road and Missouri roads. Robert S. Stevens was its brains and road-builder.

12 - [1894] - The heaviest rain in over a year at Russell put citizens in a quandry. A church had held special prayers for rain on Sunday, but W.H. Wilder, rainmaker, began operations on the day of the rain.

13 - [1881] - The State Pharmaceutical Association unanimously adopts the following: "Resolved, That we recommend to the druggists of the State that no application for permits covering the sale of intoxicating liquors be made, except for test cases, until the law shall have been so interpreted by the Supreme Court of this State as to make plain our status under it, particularly with reference to the provisions of section 10, and that in the meantime, no sale of liquors be made.

20 - [1922] - "Powder River," official motion picture of World War I, was shown at Topeka. The picture cost \$10,000,000 and was released by the federal government.

23 - [1872] - A terrific tornado at Coffeyville destroys the office of [Edmund G.] Ross's Paper.

24 - [1867] - Earthquake shock, at 2:45 P.M., in eastern Kansas and western Missouri. A second shock soon followed. A few chimneys fell.

29 - [1847] - Rev. John Schoenmakers arrives at the Osage Mission, now in Neosho county, accompanied by Rev. John J. Bax and Rev. Paul Ponziglione. The school for boys was established May 10th. Several Sisters of Lorette arrived October 5th, and established a school for girls. Both schools are still in a flourishing condition [1886].

30 - [1863] - The Commissioners appointed by the Governor report to him that they have selected forty acres of land near Lawrence as a site for the University buildings.




